Let us come before God with contrite and open hearts, striving to be honest in admitting our shortcomings and open to receiving forgiveness so that we might let go and move on. In trust and confidence let us go to the Lover of our souls to confess our sin as we pray together the prayer of confession printed in our bulletins, pausing at its end for a moment of silent prayer. Let us pray... \*PRAYER OF CONFESSION

Merciful Savior, we confess that we have been ungrateful recipients of the vast treasure that is

your holy scripture. We have heard your word but not obeyed it, believed the "right" things but not lived them; claimed to know you, but not followed the life you modeled. You call us to trust, but we fail to loosen our grip of control. You invite us to abide, but we chase our own pursuits. You give the Sabbath for our rest, but we ignore it. Forgive us and restore our abandoned wisdom. Lead us to follow your word that we may live in your joy and peace continually. Amen.

(Pause for about 30 seconds of silence.)

#### **SCRIPTURE READINGS**

Our first lesson for this morning is taken from Deuteronomy, the eighteenth chapter, beginning with the twentieth verse. I will be reading from the New International Version, but you are invited to follow along on page #168 in your pew bibles.

Listen now for the word of God...

"But a prophet who presumes to speak in my name anything I have not commanded, or a prophet who speaks in the name of other gods, is to be put to death."

You may say to yourselves, "How can we know when a message has not been spoken by the LORD?" If what a prophet proclaims in the name of the LORD does not take place or come true, that is a message the LORD has not spoken. That prophet has spoken presumptuously, so do not be alarmed."

The liturgist will return to his seat either on the chancel or with his family and friends in the congregation.

When the liturgist finishes, the preacher will step into the pulpit & say...

Our second reading this morning is taken from Paul's second letter to Timothy, the fourth chapter, beginning with the first verse. I will be reading the New International Version, but I encourage you to follow along in your pew bibles. You can find the passage in them on page #1039.

Listen once more for the word of God...

"... I give you this charge:

"Preach the word; be prepared in season and out of season; correct, rebuke and encourage—with great patience and careful instruction. For the time will come when people will not put up with sound doctrine.

Instead, to suit their own desires, they will gather around them a great number of teachers to say what their itching ears want to hear. They will turn their ears away from the truth and turn aside to myths.

"But you, keep your head in all situations, endure hardship, do the work of an evangelist, discharge all the duties of your ministry."

Leader: ...This is the Word of the Lord.

THE SERMON

"Conform to the Word, Not to the World"

**Dr. Pierre Boumtje** 

Let us pray:

Eternal God, Your Word is a lamp to our feet and a light to our path. Give us grace to receive your truth in faith and love. Give us strength to follow on the path you set before us; Through Jesus Christ our Lord and Savior, Amen!

It is always a humbling honor to come to this pulpit, and I am very grateful for the privilege. We live in a rapidly changing world, the 21<sup>st</sup> century society and culture. In this new society and culture, individuals, institutions, and communities face new challenges and must adjust to social demands of this time to survive and stay relevant. Charles Darwin, a famous scientist would say: "It is not the strongest of the species that survives, nor the most intelligent that survives. It is the one that is most adaptable to change".

Most responses to these new social and cultural demands have consisted of adopting new attitudes, new norms, new values, new behavior, new laws, new policies, *etc* ... to better reflect what we generally perceive as values of inclusion, diversity, fairness, and opportunity for all.

You may be familiar with the saying that: "Life is like a box of chocolates (can you finish it for me?) ... you never know what you are getting." Well, this past spring, I attended a workshop in Little Rock and one speaker described today's life in the following terms: "Today's life is more like a vending machine, you put some change in it, and you get exactly what you want". The focus here is on "getting what I want", satisfying my personal desires, as long as I put in some change. That's our 21st Century approach to all aspects of life.

We tend to adjust everything to suit our personal desires, including matters of faith. One of the problems in today's culture is that too many of us come to Scripture asking the wrong question. We come asking, "What does this passage mean to <a href="mailto:mee">me</a>?" or "What does this passage mean to this social group or that social group? Everyone trying to put some adjustments in Scripture if necessary, in order to get exactly what we want.

Different denominations in the Christian community have been reshaping their message and their doctrines to stay relevant in today's culture, trying to accommodate demands from different social groups. The danger is when these new doctrines or reshaped messages lose consistency with the Word of God just for the sake of accommodating social demands.

The proper question to ask when we approach the scripture is not what this passage mean to me. It is: What did <u>God</u> mean by this passage? He is the author of the Scripture and only he can tell us what He meant in every passage.

This confusion about the question is a problem because we tend to confuse multiple meanings with multiple applications.

For example, the Bible says, "Thou shalt not steal". That only has one meaning, but it has a multiple applications. Thou shalt not steal is not just about rubbing a bank, it means that I will give 100% of my time and talents to my employer while I am at work. To do less is to steal from my employer. I must not fudge or lie on my tax returns to increase my refund because to do so is to steal from my state, or my country. -- one meaning with a multitude of applications.

The essence of the message this morning is that today, in an attempt to conform to new social demands, some church institutions dilute the truth or end up departing from the truth. Today's culture seems to have started dictating to the church what is right and what is wrong. Paul saw this coming, he did warn Timothy about it and he is warning us today as well.

### What is in there for me? That's the question we like to ask.

One very familiar story in the Bible relates to Israel's rejection of the form of government God had chosen for them. The story is recorded in 1 Samuel chapter 8. For some 300+ years God had placed judges over Israel, but the time came when they wanted to change, to replace God's plan with their own, and the only reason was that they wanted conformity with the world around them. They refused to hear the warnings given by Samuel because their desire was to be like other nations. "Then we will be like all the other nations", they said. That was a social demand of their time. They wanted their way over God's way.

## What is in there for me is the question we keep asking.

Closer to us, I read a story about Franklin Roosevelt Jr. and I was told it is a true story. The story says that at one time Franklin D. Roosevelt, Jr., was sick with a staff infection of the throat. A new medicine called **sulpha-nil-amide** was tried with amazing success.

The publicity of the case caused the drug to be in great demand.

What is in there for me? Some patients are not comfortable with swallowing pills. To accommodate patients who did not like the tablet form of the drug, a pharmaceutical company in Tennessee conceived the idea of preparing the drug in a liquid form. They dissolved it in **diethylamide** glycol which by itself was known to be very safe.

Unfortunately, the liquid form of the drug proved to be very costly and fatal. Sixty one patients died after taking it. A harmless lifesaving drug in one form became a poison in another form. It was not something that was taken away that made the drug deadly, but something that was added to accommodate those who prefer liquid form to tablets.

We all know that many types of medicine come in different forms to fit different tastes and preferences. If you shop Walmart over the counter medicines like I do, you have certainly noticed that for every brand, you have a cheaper "Equate" version. I personally look first for "equate" versions because they are cheap. Low cost is what is there for me. I have seen cough medicine with all kinds of tastes, orange taste, blue berries taste, strawberry taste, or grape taste. Everyone gets their preferred taste of the same medicine.

In theory, all versions of the same medicine have the same active ingredient, that's the chemical substance that actually heals. Any other substance is just part of the supporting materials.

But most pharmacists will tell you the truth that all generic brands of the same medicine do not always work the same. Some of the so-called supporting materials may actually delay, impede, or block the release of the active ingredient. In worse cases, added substances may produce an unintended or even a fatal result. That's probably what happened with the liquid form of the medicine that healed Franklin Roosevelt.

It is not always wise to change the form of an important drug to fit our own tastes, and our desires. It might just be wise to accept to swallow the original proven pill without changing anything, no matter how uncomfortable that seems to be.

The Word of God is such a medicine that does not need adjustments for personal tastes or conformity with social demands.

The Word of God is a standard, like a meter stick. It is what we come back to measure our words and actions to see if they accurately reflect the truth of God.

Paul clearly warns about that in his charge to Timothy: "For the time will come when people will not put up with sound doctrine. Instead, to suit their own desires, they will gather around them a great number of teachers to say what their itching ears want to hear." Maybe that time has already come in some Christian denominations, including ours. What are your ears itching to hear today? The sacred unchanging truth or the comfort of a changing culture?

The first thing to recognize when facing changes along with new social demands is that God Himself NEVER changes. This is the bedrock of our faith, peace, security, and confidence when facing the past, present, and future. And He said His Word doesn't change either. Matthew 24:35 confirms that "Heaven and earth will pass away, but my words will never pass away". This is the anchor for dealing with all changes because He is the one thing that can be counted on to NOT change!

The Word of God shouldn't be subject to dilution of any sort, for conformity with cultural trends of our time. Paul urges the church to stand on the truth, the truth of God's Word. In the face of cultural changes and new social demands, we must come to grips with the Truth, and stop desiring OUR own versions of the truth. We need to be influencing society, not the other way around. As Chesterton would say, "We do not want a church that will move with the world. We want a church that will move the world." -- G.K. Chesterton, The New Witness. Christianity Today, Vol. 30 no. 8.

The Word of God is not a vending machine from which you get what you want provided you put in some change.

For us Christians, the Word of God should be like a clean and clear mirror. We face it. If you don't like what we see, don't change the mirror. Of course putting some dark powder on the mirror will result in hiding the dirty spots you don't like on your face. But that's not what we want. Face the clear mirror, if you don't like what you see, clean the dirty spots on your face. That's the only meaningful change we need to make.

#### PASTORAL PRAYER & THE LORD'S PRAYER

Let us pray: Father, as we continue to live in this changing world, sanctify us by your Word. Your Word is Truth. May your Holy Spirit mend our ways, thoughts, words, and actions, so we can conform to your word of truth, and not to the world around us. Through Jesus Christ our Lord and Savior, who taught us to pray saying:

Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy name. Thy kingdom come, thy will be done; On earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread; And forgive us our debts, as we forgive our debtors; And lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil. For thine is the kingdom and the power and the glory, forever. Amen.

The guest preacher will introduce the final hymn saying....
